SAN JOAQUIN POCKET MOUSE (PEROGNATHUS INORNATUS)

Description

The San Joaquin pocket mouse is a small-sized pocket mouse, with a head and body length of about 2.5-3 inches. The tail is long or slightly longer than the body, slightly pencil-shaped, faintly bicolored, and tufted. These mice have buffy to pinkish, soft fur with black hairs on the back, and are white below.

Habitat

These mice inhabit arid annual grasslands, savanna, and desert shrub associations. Substrates are generally sandy

or otherwise fine-textured soils. Their burrow entrances are about an inch in diameter.

Range/distribution

Throughout the San Joaquin Valley.
