KERN MALLOW (EREMALCHE KERNENSIS)

Federal/California status: Endangered/--California Native Plant Society List 1B



Description

Kern mallow is an annual plant in the mallow family (Malvaceae). The stem height and habit vary depending on seasonal rainfall. Plants may be single-stemmed or multi-stemmed, with the central stem erect and the side stems trailing along the ground. Stems can be 1 to nearly 20 inches (2.5 to 50 cm) tall. Leaves are deeply lobed and flowers are single or in pairs in the base of the upper leaves. Flowers have 5 petals and are white in color. A few individuals may have pale lavender flowers. The plant blooms March and April but may continue flowering into May in wet years. The fruits are wheel-shaped.

Habitat/Range

Kern mallow has always had a highly-restricted distribution. It is found in Valley saltbush scrub habitat and is known only from the Lokern area of Kern County.
