SUBTLE ORACHE (ATRIPLEX SUBTILIS)

California Native Plant Society List 1B



Description

Subtle orache is an annual member of the goosefoot family (Chenopodiaceae). It is quite similar to brittlescale (Atriplex depressa) and lesser saltscale (A. minuscula). The upright stems are often reddish-purple, like the latter. Subtle orache has leaves that are only 0.08 to 0.16 inch (2 to 4 mm) long, which are smaller than those of brittlescale. The two species also differ in minute details of the reproductive parts. Unlike lesser saltscale, subtle orache has primarily opposite leaves and branches. The inconspicuous male and female flowers of subtle orache are mixed in the leaf axils and appear from August to October.

Habitat

This species occurs in grasslands, often in the vicinity of vernal pools

Range/distribution

It is known from Butte, Merced, Madera, Fresno, Tulare , Kings, and Kern counties.
